Sara Marie Squire Class of 2023 Bachelor of Science, Nursing Associate in Science, Nursing

Originally from Delaware, Sara Squire moved to the Florida Keys in 2012 to pursue a career on the water. After years of maritime work, including earning a 100-Ton U.S. Coast Guard Captain's License, Sara decided she was ready to make a career change into the medical field. In 2018, she began taking classes at The College of The Florida Keys and successfully graduated with her Associate in Science in Nursing in the spring of 2021. She immediately began working towards her Bachelor of Science in Nursing, which she is graduating with today.

During her five years of classes at CFK, Sara remained actively involved at the College and in the community. She volunteered over 150 hours to administer COVID-19 vaccines during the pandemic and provided service for various at-risk populations. She was also the Vice President of CFK's Student Nurses Association and volunteered with the Special Olympics. While earning her degrees, Sara achieved momentous personal milestones, including marrying her husband, Ryan, and having their daughter, Piper.

Sara plans to continue working as a Home Health Nurse serving the Florida Keys' homebound population. She aspires to continue her education to obtain a master's degree and become a Nurse Practitioner in family medicine.

Keynote Speaker

Bill Becker Retired News Director, US1 Radio/ Florida Keys Media LLC

Bill Becker was born and raised in New York City. His love of the ocean propelled his path to his first career and the Florida Keys. Bill earned a bachelor's and a master's degree in Marine Biology from City College of New York and the University of Delaware, respectively. Immediately following college, he took a position at the Newfound Harbor Marine Institute at Seacamp in Big Pine Key. He served as the marine biology instructor and assistant director for nine years.

In 1980, Bill shifted his professional focus to broadcast journalism. He served as the News Director at US1 Radio/ Florida Keys Media LLC for 40 years, producing and hosting the popular Morning Magazine news show on US1 Radio. His work earned two national Edward R. Murrow Awards from the Radio and Television News Directors Association. Following his retirement, Bill donated more than 3,000 cassette recordings of interviews, live broadcasts, and meetings to CFK to archive so unique audio history of the Keys could be available to students and the public.

Bill has served the community in numerous other ways. He was a founder and past president of the Big Pine Key Botanical Society. He co-founded and produced the Underwater Music Festival in 1984 and served as president of the Lower Keys Chamber of Commerce and Big Pine Key Civic Association. Currently, Bill is a mentor for Take Stock in Children. He also teaches in a STEM program for fifth graders at Sugarloaf School called "The Art and Science of Big Bubbles," funded by a Florida Keys Council of the Arts grant. This work earned him the nickname "Bubbleman" and the formal title of "Senior Volunteer of the Year" at the school.

Bill lives on Sugarloaf Key with his wife, Bernadette. They have two daughters and four grandchildren, including one granddaughter who is a student at CFK.

The Academic Processional

The academic processional officially preludes the Commencement ceremonies on college and university campuses and is one of the oldest and most colorful customs.

The traditions surrounding academic ceremonies, such as Commencement, are rooted in the customs of the Middle Ages when universities were first formed. Gowns and mortar boards, or caps, were a common form of dress during that era. Today, graduates wear colorful academic apparel, signifying their alma maters and highest degrees received.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

Graduation gowns of associates, bachelors, and masters are usually without trimmings of any sort, whereas those of doctors are faced down the front with velvet and adorned with three velvet bars on the sleeves. College president gowns have four velvet bars.

Attached to a button atop the **mortarboard** is a **tassel**, worn on the right side until degrees are conferred.

The **hood** is a triangular fold of cloth worn over the back of the gown. The colors of the face denote the wearer's degree and the colors of the lining are those of the college or university that granted the degree. The length of the hood is correspondingly longer with each higher degree.

The **colors** of the wide velvet borders extending down the front of the doctoral gown, the velvet bars on the sleeves and the borders of most hoods, represent the scholarly field of the wearer:

PRESIDENTIAL REGALIA

The **Presidential Medallion** and **Chains of Office** comprise the large metal necklace worn by a college's president as part of official ceremonial regalia. Both are ancient symbols of authority and important expressions that honor the history and traditions of higher education.

CEREMONIAL ACADEMIC MACE

The **Ceremonial Academic Mace** is an institutional symbol of strength and authority. CFK's official mace was created in 2022 by a committee comprised of faculty and staff in collaboration with artists from the College and the community. Carefully crafted to reflect CFK's unique values and personality, the design represents a legacy of academic excellence, student achievement, and commitment to the Keys community.

The CFK Mace combines art mediums, consisting of pewter, wood, and glass. The Mace's shaft is embellished with palm trees. The fronds are carved into Cuban Mahogany and the trunk is made from a Sapodilla tree that once grew on the Key West Campus. Pewter coins depicting the College's seal and colorful tassels representing each academic and career training program encircle the mace. Above the coins is a pewter Tuga, the College's mascot and symbol of strength and perseverance. The top is adorned with an orange and blue blown glass sphere inspired by the sun and ocean of the Florida Keys.

The College recognizes and thanks the artists who brought the mace to life: metal artist Reen Stanhouse, wood artists Stephen Hatchett (mace) and Lieutenant David Black (stand), and blown glass artist Wes Hunting.
